DR. SHAUNEEN PETE

RESTORYING TOWARD INDIGENOUS RESURGENCE & SETTLER DECOLONIZATION

Unlearning colonial ways will engage you in deep learning about racial oppression. Dr. Shauneen Pete will lead us through a critical understanding of settler colonial relationships, and what settlers need to do in order to decolonize. This session will guide participants toward a deeper level of engagement with Indigeneity. It will help participants let go of limiting assumptions and guide them toward a vision for reconciliation. Through storying Dr. Pete will share pedagogical practices which allow for a deeper understanding of both Indigenous resurgence and settler decolonization; and will re-story a vision to advance our reconciliation efforts to dismantle systemic oppression in all its forms.



CULTIVATING SAFE SPACES

Cultivating Safe Spaces is a worldview shifting framework that was developed to empower individuals who may be struggling to understand what decolonization and reconciliation looks like. It is much more than diversity, inclusion, cultural safety and employee wellness. It is a framework that supports systems change and shifts in policy, process, agenda development and encourages participants to work from their best selves by centering well-being to promote effectiveness and productivity. This session will take participants from a place of insecurity and overwhelm to a state of focus and empowerment and enhances their ability to communicate effectively and make valuable contributions to the ongoing transformation of systems.

This workshop will integrate core principles of neurodevelopment and traumatology to inform work with children, families, and the communities in which they live.

Participants will learn to help identify the strengths and vulnerabilities of the children and youth struggling with trauma histories and/or mental health and co-occurring disorders. This workshop will focus on understanding the foundations of trauma and attachment dysregulation. Participants will learn the neurological, physiological, cognitive and emotional impacts of trauma. Considerations through a trauma lens and strategies to promote emotional regulation will result in less stressed systems (both caregiving, management and above) and more supportive coregulated environments.

It speaks to the nature of Two Spirit roles & responsibilities within families, communities and Nations. It also outlines the history and realities of Two Spirit peoples and how settler-colonialism has negatively affected their socio-political, socio-cultural and socioeconomic conditions.

Chance comes from the Kinosew Sipi Cree Nation in Treaty 5 Territory and currently resides in Winnipeg, Manitoba. He is a proud Swampy Cree and 2Spirit person who embraces his Cree language and queer identity. Chance has western education in Political Studies and Indigenous Studies from the University of Manitoba. Chance focuses his advocacy around Indigenous language revitalization, youth empowerment, land & water protection, Indigenous student rights and 2SLGBTQIA+ empowerment. He began his healing journey five years ago and has been learning from many knowledgeable mentors from his home community and beyond. Chance currently works as a Consultant and Independent Contractor for numerous organizations throughout Manitoba.

As an ASIST trainee, you will be better able to:

- Recognize and assista person with thoughtsto avoid suicide
- Discuss suicide with a person with thoughts in a direct manner
- Demonstrate the skillsrequiredto intervene with a person at risk of suicide
- •Recognizethatcaregiversandpersonswiththoughtsareaffectedby personal and societal attitudesabout suicide
 - · Learn risk alertsand develop a safe plan related to them
- List the typesof resources available to a person with thoughts of suicide
 - Make commitment to advocacy, improving communityresourcesandnetworking

Recognize that suicide prevention is broader than suicide intervention and, includes life promotion and self-care for persons with thoughts and for caregivers
